CASE STUDY SEP-DEC 2024

REBUILDING HOPE AND EDUCATION IN GGES BANBHAN

My name is Tasleem Akhtar, and I am a Class 8 student at GGES Banbhan, a small village school in Tehsil Taunsa, District DG Khan, South Punjab, Pakistan. Like many schools in the region, ours faced significant challenges after heavy rains and strong winds caused the front boundary wall to collapse, leaving our classrooms and facilities in poor condition. This situation was especially difficult for girls like me, as safety concerns made families hesitant to send their daughters to school.

In our community, which mostly comprises Baloch families, the safety and privacy of girls are highly valued. The absence of a secure boundary wall created a barrier to education, as many families felt it was unsafe for their daughters to attend school. As a result, several girls, including myself, had to stay home, which interrupted our studies and dreams for the future.

Assistance came through UNICEF and Sanjh Preet, who stepped in to support flood-affected schools in our district. Their intervention provided not only essential educational supplies but also addressed missing facilities and critical repairs needs. Through consultations with our school council, a School Development Plan (SDP) was developed to prioritize critical needs, including rebuilding the boundary wall.

A supervisory committee, containing the members from the School Clouncil, local philanthropist and DEAs representatives, ensured that the repair work met the needs of our school. Thanks to these efforts and contributions from the Non-Salary Budget (NSB), the boundary wall was successfully reconstructed and other missing facilities were provided, allowing girls to return to school without fear.

Additional improvements, such as repairing washrooms, painting the school building, and fixing classroom floors, have transformed our school into a safer and more welcoming learning environment.

On behalf of my fellow students and school management, I extend heartfelt gratitude to Sanjh Preet and UNICEF for their timely intervention. Their efforts have restored our school and renewed our ability to pursue education. This project demonstrates how even minor repairs can significantly impact the lives of students, especially girls, empowering us to achieve our dreams and build a brighter future.



PREVENTION OF CHILD PROTECTION RISKS THROUGH COMMUNITY EMPOWERMENT IN THE TARGET DISTRICTS OF PUNJAB



Sanjh Preet, in collaboration with UNICEF, is implementing a two-year Child Protection Project titled "Prevention of Child Protection Risks through Community Empowerment in the Target Districts of Punjab." This initiative focuses on establishing and strengthening community-based child protection mechanisms to safeguard children from issues such as violence, abuse, exploitation, and neglect. The project covers seven districts across Punjab: Rawalpindi, Kasur, Multan, Muzaffargarh, Bahawalpur, DG Khan, and Rajanpur. It aims to work in close coordination with key line departments, including the Social Welfare Department and the Child Protection & Welfare Bureau, to ensure a comprehensive approach to child protection. One of the critical activities involves developing and getting approval for the Terms of Reference (ToRs) for Child Protection Committees from relevant authorities. Additionally, the project will roll out UNICEF-developed packages on parenting skills and community engagement within the target communities. Through various awareness-raising and advocacy activities, the project aspires to reach and impact 200,000 individuals across these regions.



NURTURING HAPPY FUTURES: EMPOWERING POSITIVE PARENTING

The Sanjh Preet Organization, in collaboration with UNICEF, is driving child protection initiatives in District Kasur. To equip parents of children aged six to seventeen with positive parenting skills, interactive sessions were conducted emphasizing non-abusive communication, emotional support, and nurturing behaviors.

In Ramayana, a community facing child protection challenges, Mr. Usman exhibited verbally abusive behavior, harming his children's well-being. Encouraged by the project team, he joined the sessions and learned strategies to replace aggression with positive reinforcement. Group discussions helped him reflect on his practices and understand the impact of his behavior.

"Mr. Usman's transformation is evident. Over the past month, he has refrained from abusive language, fostering an emotionally secure home," said Mr. Asad, a Community Observer. This change has significantly improved his children's emotional security and development.

This case highlights the effectiveness of community-based interventions in promoting positive parenting and advancing child protection in District Kasur.

COUNTERING AND PREVENTING TERRORISM IN DISTRICT RAJANPUR, PUNJAB, PAKISTAN





Sanjh Preet, with technical and financial support from the European Union through the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC), is implementing a project titled Countering and Preventing Terrorism in District Rajanpur, Punjab, Pakistan. This initiative is strategically designed to enhance the digital literacy and IT competencies of students in madrassas, while simultaneously building the institutional capacities of civil society organizations (CSOs) and local leaders. The project also aims to promote social cohesion and community resilience through targeted interventions. Implementation is undertaken in close coordination with madrassa authorities, government agencies, educational institutions, and religious leaders to ensure alignment with national action plans for countering violence and extremism. Key components of the project include awareness campaigns, youth engagement programs, and the establishment of support mechanisms for vulnerable populations. These efforts collectively aim to foster an inclusive, tolerant, and non-violent social fabric within the community.

PROJECTS SEP-DEC 2024

IMPROVING LIVELIHOODS OF YOUTH BY IMPARTING SUSTAINABLE COMPUTER SKILLS

In the district of Nankana Sahib, Sanjh Preet, in collaboration with the Muslim Charity, is transforming lives through IT skills training, graphic designing, e-commerce, and freelancing at GTTC More Khunda. This initiative, a first of its kind with TEVTA, is paving the way for underprivileged youth to gain valuable tech-based skills. Following the successful pilot of this project, a similar initiative is being replicated in District Rajanpur, incorporating IT courses in five madrassahs to expand its reach and impact. The first batch of students in Nankana Sahib has successfully completed their six-month course, demonstrating remarkable progress, with many already earning through small freelancing projects. Currently, 24 students are enrolled in the second batch, reflecting the program's growing popularity. A closing ceremony will be held for the first batch, where certificates from TEVTA and Sanjh Preet will be awarded. Efforts are ongoing to support graduates in securing job opportunities. The students' dedication and progress underscore their readiness to excel in the digital world.







SANJH SMALL BUSINESS

With the incredible support of our generous donors, we successfully established 22 distinguished businesses to empower deserving families in District Nankana Sahib and Lahore. These businesses include vegetable shops, fruit and vegetable stalls, shoe repair setups, toy shops, grocery stores, and food stalls. This initiative is providing these families with sustainable means to generate income and improve their livelihoods.







COMMUNITY SESSIONS ON SOCIAL BEHAVIOR CHANGE (SBC)

With technical and financial support from UNICEF's SBC section, a one-month Social Behavior Change (SBC) campaign was launched across 20 union councils in all three tehsils of District Rajanpur. The campaign covered Tehsil Jampur (3 union councils), Tehsil Rojhan (3 union councils), and Tehsil Rajanpur (14 union councils). The field team set a target of conducting 50 sessions per union council, aiming for a total of 1,000 sessions. Surpassing this goal, they successfully conducted 1,008 sessions, engaging 38,748 community members, including 8,117 men, 17,880 women, 6,631 boys, and 6,120 girls. Additionally, 400 volunteers were identified and mobilized to support the campaign. These volunteers conducted 590 sessions, reaching 21,257 community members—5,339 men, 9,704 women, 3,271 boys, and 2,943 girls. The campaign's widespread outreach highlights its significant role in fostering social behavior change across the district.







BIRTH REGISTRATION CAMPAIGN

A targeted Birth Registration Campaign was launched in five selected union councils of District Rajanpur—Wang, Murghie, Fateh Pur, Fazilpur, and Kot Tahir—to register 5,000 children without birth certificates. The campaign successfully met and exceeded its goal, ensuring the registration of over 5,000 children, achieving a 100% success rate. To recognize the efforts of the field team and the staff of the Local Government & Community Development Department, an award ceremony was held. Officials from the department, along with UNICEF's Child Protection and Education teams, presented appreciation certificates to acknowledge their dedication and contributions.
