Sanjh Preet, in collaboration with UNICEF, the European Union, and the School Education Department, South Punjab, successfully completed minor repairs and maintenance in 100 flood-affected schools in DG Khan and Rajanpur. This initiative improved infrastructure and provided essential facilities while ensuring high-quality standards. With active engagement of school councils and Field monitoring teams, the project created a better learning environment for over 58,000+ children.


























BIRTH REGISTRATION CAMPAIGN

A one month birth registration campaign was launched across five Union Councils (UCs) in Rajanpur to ensure every child's right to identity. The initiative included meetings at the Secretariat and District levels, hiring two facilitators per UC (one male, one female), and an orientation for district officers, UC secretaries, and field staff.

To maximize outreach, diverse strategies were used, including UC-level camps, IEC material distribution, street theatre performances, cable TV messages, mosque announcements, awareness sessions, and social media campaigns.



On **January 8th**, a workshop in Rajanpur brought together officials, UC secretaries, and field staff to discuss a one-month birth registration campaign in **five UCs**. They shared challenges, successes, and ideas on how to make birth registration easier for families. The discussion highlighted street theatre, mosque announcements, and social media as key ways to raise awareness. The workshop focused on improving the process and continuing efforts to ensure every child is registered.

Campaign Case Study

Jamila Bibi, an 18-year-old girl from Basti Laal Khan in UC Wang, faced gender discrimination from a young age. While her brothers were registered at birth, she and her sister were not, because their parents believed girls did not need education or jobs.

Without a birth certificate, Jamila could not enroll in school. Her parents expected her to stay home and do household work. But Jamila wanted to study and build a better future.

During the birth registration campaign, a social mobilizer invited Jamila's mother to a counseling session. There, she learned why birth registration and education are important for girls. Inspired by this, she convinced her husband to register both daughters.

This changed Jamila's life, giving her the chance to pursue education and a brighter future. Her story shows how awareness and community efforts can break barriers and create real change.



Did You Know?

Pakistan has 1.2 to 1.5 million street children, many forced into child labor due to poverty, domestic violence, unemployment, and lack of education.

Empowering Children with Online Safety Awareness through Interactive Theater Performances

Sanjh Preet Organisation, with support from powerful conducted a partners, awareness campaign on online child protection across seven districts in Punjab. Using 35 interactive theater performances, the initiative educated children about online dangers, safe internet practices, reporting mechanisms.

The performances were held in Multan, Muzaffargarh, Dera Ghazi Khan, Bahawalpur, Rajanpur, Kasur, and Rawalpindi, reaching a large number of children. Each session highlighted risks like cyberbullying, online grooming, and unsafe content while promoting strong passwords, settings, and privacy responsible social media use.

Children were also given essential helpline numbers, including 1121 (Child Protection), 0839393 (Cyber Harassment), and 1099 (Zainab Alert App).

Interactive Q&A sessions followed every performance, allowing children to engage, ask questions, and reinforce their learning. Feedback was actively used to refine future performances, ensuring greater impact and understanding.



Hareema's Story: A Mother's Fight Against Fate



Hareema, a 14-year-old girl from UC Sameena, Tehsil DG Khan, was about to be married off due to poverty and cultural beliefs that girls are an economic burden. Her father and grandfather had arranged her marriage, thinking it would ease their financial struggles.

However, Hareema's mother, Shazia, did not agree and refused to let destiny steal her child's future. he had once believed, like many others, that marriage was the only path for girls. But that changed after joining the Child Protection Committee, she learned about the risks of early marriage and discovered a truth more powerful than tradition—girls deserve to grow, to learn, to dream. With the support of the Sanjh Preet Organization, she convinced her husband and father-in-law to postpone the marriage.

Shazia's courage not only saved her child but also inspired others in her community.

She later helped another girl avoid child marriage and is now committed to protecting children's rights. Her story proves that awareness and collective action can bring real change, ensuring a better future for young girls.

Today, Hareema is free. Free to study, to laugh, to build a future on her own terms. And Shazia is no longer just a mother—she is a warrior, a protector, and a beacon of hope in a world where too many childhoods are lost to tradition.

IMPROVING LIVELIHOODS OF YOUTH BY IMPARTING SUSTAINABLE COMPUTER SKILLS

In the district of Nankana Sahib, Sanjh Preet, in collaboration with the Muslim Charity, is transforming lives through IT skills training, graphic designing, e-commerce, and freelancing at GTTC More Khunda. This initiative, a first of its kind with TEVTA, is paving the way for underprivileged youth to gain valuable tech-based skills. Following the successful pilot, a similar initiative is being replicated in District Rajanpur, incorporating IT courses in five madrassahs to expand its reach and impact.



A closing ceremony was held for the first batch, marking a significant milestone. A delegation from Muslim Charity UK visited the lab, engaging with students and distributing certificates. The eventshowcased inspiring success stories, with students sharing how the training enabled them to earn through freelancing. Their achievements were celebrated, highlighting the transformative the impact of program. Currently, 24 students are enrolled in the second batch, reflecting the program's growing popularity.



SANJH SCHOOLS - Enrolment, Retention and Progression of Out of School Children (OOSC) in Islamabad Capital Territory (ICT)

The Ministry of Federal Education and Professional Training, Government of Pakistan, has selected Sanjh Preet Organization as an Education Service Provider under the Out-of-School Children (OOSC) Enrollment, Retention, and Progression (ERP-OOSC) Project in Islamabad Capital Territory (ICT). The initiative aims to enroll and support 500 out-of-school children across UC-02, 09, 18, 19, 20, and 41, ensuring they have access to quality education.

Through Accelerated Learning Pathways, digital content, and flexible learning solutions, the project enables children to enter school, return to school, or continue learning at home, in non-formal education centers, or schools. Trained teachers and facilitators are being provided to create an inclusive learning environment, integrating formal, informal, skill-based, and civic education.

This initiative is a significant step toward reducing the number of out-of-school children and ensuring every child in ICT has a pathway to a brighter future.
